


'meet the author' event and

# **Aerial Spray Completed**



# **Hammond House Update**

On August 29th, the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) will hear the case on the proposed development of the Hammond House property. The initial development application was made in 2012 and the City remains in opposition to the landowner's proposal. The SFRA reached out to the City requesting an updated staff report and application information but did not hear back in time for publishing. The information below is from a May 2014 City Staff Report.

- Change the land use of a portion of the property from "greenbelt" to "residential low density 2" to permit detached, semi-detached and duplex dwellings.
- Retain the Hammond House on a smaller lot within the existing lot.
- Remove 178 of 200 trees > 6" on the lands currently zoned "greenbelt."
- Channelize the remaining above-grade portions of Loyalist Creek and grade the site for development.
- Create 7 new lots on either side of the creek at the north end of the property and south of the retained Hammond House.





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# 'Tis the season for Vegan Two Potato Salad!

With summer BBQ season upon us, it's time to get the gang together 6 large white potatoes to enjoy the backyard. Finding dishes that are easy to prepare and suitable for different diets make it easy for the chef to enjoy the party, too!

This vegan potato salad is delicious with only a few simple ingredients and it can be made hours in advance to allow the flavours to blend. The potatoes can be boiled the night before or early in the morning. Another quick tip is to buy the sweet potatoes already peeled and cubed.



### **Inaredients:**

4 sweet potatoes (or 1 14 oz. container) 3 green onions

1 cup Hellmann's vegan mayonnaise 1 tsp mild curry powder Salt and pepper to taste

### **Directions:**

- 1. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil.
- 2. Peel white potatoes, cut into large cubes and add to the boiling water.
- 3. After the white potatoes have boiled for 5 to 8 minutes, add peeled and cubed sweet potatoes to the pot.
- 4. Let all the potatoes boil in the water together for 10 minutes or until you can pierce them with a fork.
- 5. Drain the potatoes thoroughly and let cool on the counter for 10 minutes and then in the refrigerator for at least one hour.
- 6. Chop celery and green onions into small pieces and add to the cold potatoes.
- 7. Mix curry powder, salt and pepper into the mayonnaise.
- 8. Add the spiced mayonnaise to the potatoes and mix thoroughly.
- 9. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve.

# Not...

But over the past couple of years I've noticed a lot more homes that are not being cared for the way they should be. I have a neighbour who doesn't cut the grass hardly ever. He also leaves his garbage bin and recycling bin out in front of his house all the time. I've also seen raccoons eating garbage in his yard. I am very frustrated when I see people who don't take any pride for their own home.

**Ed note:** A number of residents have complained about unkempt yards and garbage bins. Homeowners, including owners of rental properties, are responsible for maintaining their property according to the City's by-laws. The City has also introduced two new fines for properties that remain non-compliant.

### Tall grass and weeds

Grass and weeds on private property and the adjoining boulevard must be cut and maintained to a height not exceeding 20 cm as per the Nuisance Weed and Tall Grass Control By-law.

### Litter and waste

Waste containers must be stored in the backyard, side yard or garage when they're not out for pickup.

## RATS!

The rat control subsidy pilot program (peelregion.ca/rat-subsidy-program), which helps residents with the costs of outdoor rat issues (interior issues are not eligible), is now available until November 30th. The program reimburses residents for 50% of the cost in hiring a Region of Peel approved pest control vendor, up to a maximum of \$200 per calendar year.

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# A Pound of Cure for Crime Prevention

A car is stolen every 48 minutes in Ontario. The most popular models are high-end SUVs and trucks (Lexus RX, Toyota Highlander, Land Rover, Silverado, Sierra, etc.) Over the past 30 days, there have been two auto thefts and one break and enter reported here. While even one is considered too many, all evidence points to Sherwood Forrest being a very safe neighbourhood.

The Virtual Community Meeting hosted by Constable Rowena Pryce, 11 Division Community Liaison Officer, addressed community safety concerns and provided these crime prevention tips:

- Park your vehicle in the garage.
- Always lock car doors and roll up the windows.
- Cover or block your vehicle identification number.
- Store car keys far away from your vehicle in a FARADAY/RFID Blocking device if possible.
- Use theft prevention devices (steering wheel lock, automatic engine shut-off and/or a tracking device).

- Invest in outdoor security cameras.
- Keep all doors (garage, front, back, patio and side) locked, even when home.
- Ensure shrubs are maintained to have clear sightlines to all accessible windows and doors.
- Install bright motion sensor lights or keep exterior lights on all night.
- Get to know your neighbours and look out for each other's properties.
- Consider installing a second locking device for windows and sliding doors.
- Don't advertise travel plans on social media.
- Ask a friend or neighbour to pick up mail and care for your house while away.
- Suspend newspapers and other deliveries.

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




















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
