Is Mississauga Leaving Peel Region?

Mississauga Council Chambers was packed in early April at a public town hall meeting, about the merits of the city leaving Peel Region and becoming its own municipality.

A report commissioned by the city suggested that Mississauga was subsidizing Brampton and Caledon by \$85 million per year. However, another report done by Deloitte commissioned by the Region of Peel, disputed Mississauga's findings, suggests it would be costlier to either dissolve the region or amalgamate into a single Mega City.

Yet another study from Ernst & Young (EY) suggests that if Mississauga were to separate from the Region, Mississauga taxpayers would see \$84 million in savings.

EY's analysis, conducted between April 26 and May 21, was governed

by a steering committee which included the Chief Administrative Officers & CFOs of each of the three municipalities' (Brampton, Caledon & Mississauga) and those of Peel Region, as advisory board members.

According to Mississauga Mayor Bonnie Crombie, separation isn't exclusively about finances, but also about identity.

"Numbers aside, Mississauga has a unique identity and our own priorities that simply cannot be advanced if we continue to be a part of the Region. From our perspective, there is only one logical outcome for the third largest City in Ontario and the sixth in Canada: allow Mississauga to become an independent city and govern our own affairs."
